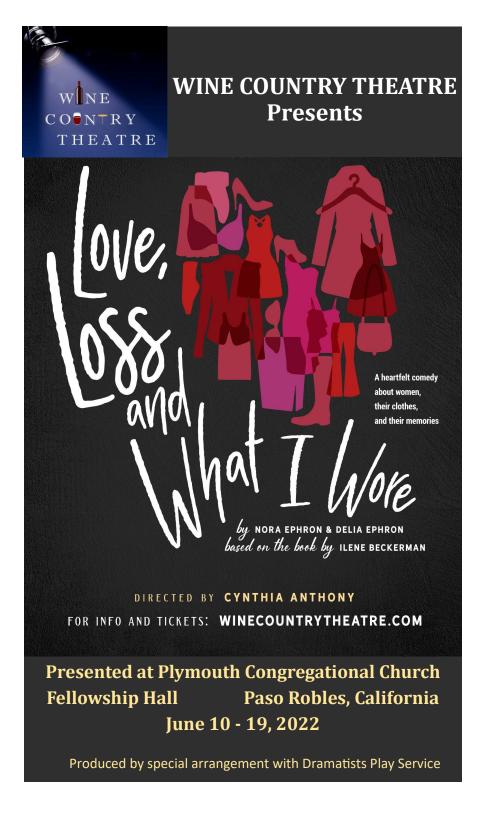

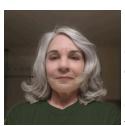

DIRECTOR'S NOTES — Cynthia Anthony

Wine Country Theatre family - Welcome back! Here we are in a new place doing what we do best, telling stories and taking you for a ride. Thank you for joining us. We have worked hard, and now it's your turn.

I read an Arts Blog recently that included a unique term: "Audiencing". "Audiencing" is a word that communicates that the audience is *working* during an arts experience. According to Matthew Reason, "That work is multiple: The audience is working at interpreting. It's working at the social experience of being with the other people in the venue... It's working emotionally. It's working empathetically. The audience is working hard at being a part of that vital dyad of performer and audience. So audiencing mirrors performing."

I love this because when we turn the word "audience" into a verb it conveys what an audience does as active, rather than passive. You are active participants, engaging your senses. This is a multi-sensory, multi-dimensional involvement. You, my friends, are at the center of this arts experience. And this play, perhaps more than most, requires your active engagement. Love, Loss and What I Wore was originally produced Off-Broadway as a Reader's Theatre performance in 2009. Since then, it has been performed all over the world as a fully staged show, and in a Reader's Theatre style. We are doing a hybrid, limited as we are by the very small stage you see before you. But small stages don't mean small shows.

Our cast and crew have worked hard to illuminate the many stories they are about to share. I promise, you will nod with recognition at many of the memories relived by ordinary women. The six actresses play over 28 different characters. This is hard, but highly fulfilling work. Now, you are about to do the hard work of interpreting, engaging in and reflecting on the many threads in the play. I am sure you will be excellent at this work and find it equally fulfilling. We are in this together. Let's do this.

While you're waiting for the non-existent curtain to raise, go ahead and draw a memory of the clothes that you remember. Enjoy the many items throughout the Hall intended to trigger your memories of What You Wore. And, guys, I bet you remember What She Wore, or didn't.
